

In winter, Alberta's geography produces the deepest, softest snow on the planet — often over 9.1 m (30 ft) per year. Start your team at a natural pace with snowshoeing. From self-guided explorations, to helicopter-assisted mountaintop treks, snowshoeing makes it easy to step into winter. Pick up the pace with cross-country skiing on hundreds of scenic trails throughout the province, including Canmore Nordic Centre Provincial Park — home of Canada's national cross-country and biathlon teams.

For real thrill-seekers, head to the mountains for the northern hemisphere's longest ski season — as many as 200 skiable days a year. Alberta's six major ski resorts, some only minutes apart, give delegates manicured terrain parks and over 580 named runs to explore. Or head into Alberta's backcountry for pristine snowcat and heli-skiing.













Natural experiences are endless in Alberta. From warm, dry summers to snow-covered winters — and the surprising amount of overlap in-between — it's amazing how many contrasting experiences can fit into one visit.

Bring delegates to ride along on a real cattle drive. Hike a frozen canyon, covered with jaw-dropping iridescent waterfalls. Or send them straight up with a professional ice-climbing guide. Let them travel by dogsled to experience Canada's most iconic transportation. Help them relax with a private sleigh ride, tucked under a cozy buffalo rug, and a dip in a natural hot spring under the stars. Or send them onto 366 m (1,200 ft) thick glaciers with specialized off-road bus tours and guided hikes covering 100,000 years of frozen history — even in the middle of summer.

# TRIP ESSENTIALS

To help get you started, we've gathered some of the basics you'll need to know for planning the trip, like how to get here, weather, climate and transportation. Please visit meetings.travelalberta.com/whychoose-alberta/incentive-trips for more in-depth information.

# DRIVERS' LICENCES

You must have a valid driver's licence to drive legally in Canada. Your own is valid for up to 12 months. International Driving Permits from your home country are also valid for one year.

#### **ROAD SAFETY AND LAWS**

Seatbelts must be worn at all times and it is against the law to use cellphones or mobile devices while driving.

#### **ROAD REPORTS**

Weather, construction and other activities result in different highway conditions across Alberta. For road reports dial **511** or visit **511** alberta.ca.

#### SPEED LIMITS

On major highways, speed limits average 110 km/h (68 mph). On

secondary routes the average is 80 km/h (50 mph) or by posted signage. Motorists passing stopped emergency vehicles or tow trucks must drive at 60 km/h (37 mph), or at the posted speed limit, whichever is slower. Obey posted speed limits within our cities and towns.

#### **AUTO INSURANCE**

If you are driving your own vehicle into Alberta, bring vehicle registration forms and a free Canadian Non-Resident Insurance Card from your insurance agent, or the policy itself. If you're driving a rented car, bring a copy of your rental contract.



# AIR

Arrive from more than 100 cities worldwide via most major airlines and charter companies. International airports: Calgary (YYC), Edmonton (YEG), Fort McMurray (YYM).



# CAR

Alberta is accessible from the east and west by two officially designated Trans-Canada routes. Rental vehicles are widely available throughout Alberta.



# BUS

Bus tours, scheduled coach services and shuttle services are available through a number of operators. Let them do the driving and relax and enjoy the trip.



# **TRAIN**

VIA Rail service is available to Edmonton and Jasper. The Rocky Mountaineer runs between Vancouver and Jasper, as well as Banff, Lake Louise and Calgary.



# TRAVEL DOCUMENTS & ENTRY REQUIREMENTS International visitors to Canada

must carry a valid passport and, if required, a valid visa. An Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA) is a mandatory entry requirement for visa-exempt foreign nationals travelling to Canada by air. Fore more information, visit cic.gc.ca.

#### INTERNATIONAL ASSISTANCE

If your organization is based outside of Canada and your event will be attended by international participants, the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) offers a single-service window for planners. As the focal point for border coordination services on behalf of the Canadian government, CBSA can provide you with support and guidance as you plan your entry into Canada. # **CANADA BORDER** SERVICES AGENCY

Agency manages Alberta's border with the United States using domestic laws that govern trade and travel. For an overview of what's involved when you enter Alberta, including ports of entry, duty-free allowances, holiday travel tips and even wait times at border crossings, visit cbsa-asfc.gc.ca.



# FOOD, PLANT & ANIMAL **INSPECTIONS**





Travellers are required to properly declare any meats, fruits, vegetables, plants, animals and plant or animal products they bring into Alberta.

5 NATIONAL PARKS 3 ARE WORLD HERITAGE SITES

#### PARK ENTRY

Park passes are required for entry into any of Canada's national parks. Buy them at park entrances, or save time and buy online: pc.gc.ca or parkpass.banfflakelouise.com. Entrance to provincial parks is free.

#### **WILDLIFE**

There are 587 species of wildlife.

All-stars include elk, moose, bighorn sheep, grizzly bear, bison, cougar and wolf.

#### WILDLIFE SAFETY

Never attempt to approach, feed or harass any wild animal. When on foot, Keep a safe distance — at least 100 m (more than 300 ft). Most animals will avoid you if they can hear you coming. Stay in your vehicle when viewing animals along roadways. Pick up brochures at visitor centres for safety tips.

### WEATHER AND CLIMATE

### **Average Temperature**

**Summer:** Daytime highs are normally 20 to 25 C (68 to 77 F) but can reach the mid to upper 30s (90s).



Winter: In the coldest months of the year, January and February, daytime temperatures range from -5 to -15 C (23 to 5 F). They can drop as low as -30 to -40 C (-22 to -40 F) for short periods of time.

### Precipitation

Annual precipitation in Alberta averages 30-60 cm (12-24 in). In the winter, the ski resorts of the Canadian Rockies can see up to 9 m (30 ft) of snowfall between November and April.

# **METRIC SYSTEM**

Canada uses the metric system, which means highway signage, speed limits and traffic indicators are posted in kilometres (km) and kilometres per hour (km/h), gas is sold by the litre and temperature is measured in degrees Celsius (C).





#### MONEY

Canada's monetary system is based on dollars and cents. We have one and two dollar coins and no pennies. Purchases are rounded up or down to the nearest 5 cents.

## Taxes

Alberta is the only province in Canada without a provincial sales tax (PST). The Government of Canada charges a five per cent goods and services tax (GST) on most purchases.

# **Banking**

Typical bank hours are 9:30-4:00, Monday to Friday, with many open Saturdays as well.
